


Summer Camp Registration








"They are encouraged to conquer their fears and accomplish things they don't even know the can," Gonzalez said.

Iron Man Competition

On July 22, Platoon 101 finished the Marine Military Academy Iron Man with the top time of 44 minutes and 51 seconds.

Iron Man had three winning platoons, one for each division. Platoon 101 took first in the Oldest Boys division; Platoon 501 took first place in the Middle Boys division with a time of 49 minutes and 40 seconds; and Platoon 901 took first in the Youngest Boys division with a time of 56 minutes and 51 seconds.

This multi-event race requires 24 campers from each platoon to participate. The whole campus is utilized during Iron Man, and the race starts and ends at Bowman Stadium.

The platoon teams must complete 12 events in the following order: Initial Run, Low Crawl, Fireman's Carry, Rifle Range, Run to Obstacle Course, Obstacle Course, Confidence Course, Run to Paintball Course, Paintball, Mud Course, Swim and Final Run.

MMA Alumnus Leaves Indelible Mark

Dr. Paul K. Olson a pioneer in the medical field

Dr. Paul Kenneth Olson, geneticist, biochemist, immunologist and cofounder of multiple companies with an emphasis in life science, died Sept. 19, 2018. He was 51.

Dr. Olson graduated from Marine Military Academy in 1985. He was born in Saint Paul, Minn., on Jan. 22, 1967, to Kenneth Olson and the late LaDonna (Lewis) Olson. Graduate of University of Medicine and Dentistry of New Jersey, PhD, Molecular Genetics, and The University of Wisconsin-Madison, BS Bacteriology.

Dr. Olson was an integral part of NUCLEUS (Louisville, Ky.) and subsequently, CORTEX (St. Louis, Mo.) research and innovation communities, where he impacted the lives of so many scientists and entrepreneurs, in addition to the many other academic and professional colleagues at universities and research institutions around the world.

Service to others, through both selfless personal devotion to his friends, family and even total strangers, and passionate pursuit of advancement in research to help treat and cure human disease, was the rent he paid for his existence.

His entrepreneurial spirit was pivotal in the founding of multiple companies to promulgate the research and development of new discoveries to help mankind and improve human health. Together with his many friends

and colleagues, Dr. Olson pioneered advancements in drug discovery, gene therapy, vaccine development and diagnostics, impacting a diverse number of medical fields and disease indications.

Potentia Pharmaceuticals, Apellis, Kypha, Common Place Holdings, OpenCell Technologies, and Serion were among the companies he helped establish or lead.

Dr. Olson's many sacrifices and discoveries will not end in death, because of the continuation of fellow entrepreneurs and researchers such as Chad Stiening, Pascal Deschatelets, Cedric Francois, Zhouning Zhang, Elizabeth Schramm, Paul Olivo, Delphine El Mehdi, Steve Wagner, John Talley, and Ming Zhou Zhou, who continue on his and their paths of discovery.

Dr. Olson's work to cure devastating ocular diseases like age-related macular degeneration has now progressed to late-stage clinical testing as a promising treatment that could help hundreds of thousands of people in a few years.

He is survived by his Father: Kenneth Olson, of Iola; friends: Mitch, Dave, Chad, Pascal, Cedric, Whayne, Vernon, Steve, Charlie, and all other deep friends, limited in space to mention, and Humanity whose betterment, he dedicated his life to. He was preceded in death by his Mother: LaDonna (Lewis) Olson.

A formal appreciation and expression of gratitude to God for Dr. Olson was held Oct. 6, 2018, at Our Savior's Lutheran Church in Iola. The Reverend Mary Bope officiated.

Dr. Olson was laid to rest at Greenwood Cemetery in River Falls, Wis.

Monument Update



The Afghanistan and Iraq campaigns were added this summer to the base of the Iwo Jima Monument at Marine Military Academy.

The Iwo Jima Monument was recently updated to reflect changes made to the U.S. Marine Corps War Memorial in Arlington, Va.

In 2017, crews with the National Parks Service added the engravings for the Afghanistan and Iraq campaigns to the base of the monument. The engravings include only the years the campaigns began, 2001 and 2003, respectively. The U.S. Marine Corps History Division advised to leave the dates open-ended with room to engrave end dates in the future.

The Iwo Jima Monument at MMA also received a new coat of paint.
