MMA Cadets, Staff Participate in Blood Drive

We've all heard the line countless times – "One blood donation can save up to three lives."

Many of us ignore the phrase, but for Marine Military Academy cadets it's a call to action.

"We are doing something good for the community," said first-time blood donor senior Pierre Bonnimond of Paris, France.

The blood drive happened Oct. 24 at the Cadet Activity Center. A second event is planned for March of 2019. Last academic year, MMA cadets and staff donated 103 units of blood. The goal is to surpass that number this year, said MMA Mathematics Chairperson and National Honor Society Sponsor Rosalinda Garcia.

"One of the main things is to save lives," Garcia said. MMA's NHS sponsors the event each semester.

Cameron Cox, donor recruitment representative for United Blood Services, spoke about the importance of having cadets donate blood. He said the donations instill empathy and

selflessness in the young men.

"The fact that they can come in and help a complete stranger ... that's amazing. It's a beautiful thing," Cox said.

Senior John Paul Boerschig II of Washington, Texas, knows how important his donation is and the impact it has on others.

"When you get that text that says, 'you saved a person's life,' it's amazing. Last year, I got one. ... Someone had been in a car accident, and my blood was used to save that person's life," Boerschig said.







Focus on Prevention

MMA faculty, staff learn about suicide epidemic

Suicide has become one of the leading causes of death among teens in America, yet it's a topic that few dare to speak about, according to mental health experts.

Marine Military Academy faculty and staff became better familiarized with the epidemic during a workshop Oct. 29. Alberto Vasquez, business development specialist for Palms Behavioral Health, spoke about the countless challenges teens face in today's world. He also offered tips on how to look for warning signs – indicators that a teen may be falling into depression.

"It's very important to be aware of what is going on," Vasquez said.

He said social media has changed the way teens interact. The platforms also have become weapons for bullies.

"Bullying is not what it used to be," he said. "(In the past) there was no social media."

Vasquez said some teens now are victims of relentless bullying through those platforms.

"There was a case of a young boy recently who was harassed everyday through social media, until he took his father's gun and took his life," Vasquez said.

He said parents don't need to be

experts in mental health to know that something is wrong with their sons.

"It's all about being aware," he said.

Vasquez said it's crucial to look for the following warning signs:

- »» Talking about suicide.
- »» Making statements about

feeling hopeless, helpless or worthless

- »» A deepening depression.
- »» Preoccupation with death.
- »» Taking unnecessary risks or exhibiting self-destructive behavior.
 - »» Out-of-character behavior.
- »» A loss of interest in things one cares about.
- »» Making arrangements or settling affairs.
- »» Giving prized possessions away.

"We must increase awareness," Vasquez said.

The workshop was part of the proactive approach MMA takes to ensure cadets have a wholesome and safe environment in which they can thrive academically and personally.

It's part of the regular training staff undergoes during the academic year.


Hill spoke about the importance of instilling the Marine Corps values of honor, courage and commitment in every cadet at MMA.

largest intermodal logistics facility in the country. Klein, a 1999 graduate of MMA, was asked to join the academy's board of advisors in 2012.

Klein spoke about the importance of a good education and building strong bonds with fellow classmates. The message resonated with the cadets.

"It's a motivation to me and to the cadets," said MMA senior and cadet Battalion Commander LtCol Trevor Roberts, of Fairbanks, Alaska.

"We are celebrating the tradition of the school ... the values. It's something we believe in," Roberts said.

The event gives cadets the

chance to share with their families their experiences at the collegepreparatory boarding school.

"It engages the families. They come in and see the growth, the discipline and the spirit that these young men have" said MMA Business Director Dr. John Butler.

"It allows us to become a closer family ... a closer-knit school and community. That is something we are very proud of," Butler said.

"We hope that as with our guest speaker ... the successes he has had ... that in some 30 years there will be a seventh-grader that was standing here and he will come back to inspire a new generation of MMA cadets," Butler said.








