


SUMMER CAMP REGISTRATION


Each company marched proudly amid thundering cheers. MMA President Col Christopher S. Dowling, USMC (Ret),





Ben shares his message with more than 100,000 students, parents, and professionals each year. In addition to his personal story, Ben discussed cyberbullying, sexting, how social media impacts mental health, and positive ways to use social media.

Academic Honors From The College Board's National Recognition Programs



Congratulations to our own Fox Company Cadet Yakobson of Ames, Iowa, who is one of 32,000 students from across the country to earn academic honors from the College Board's National Recognition Programs! These National Recognition Programs grant underrepresented students with academic honors that can be included on college and scholarship applications and connect students with universities across the country, helping them stand out during the admissions process. Colleges and scholarship programs use these honors to identify students from underrepresented groups through College Board's Student Search Service.

Cadet Yakobson earned this recognition by excelling on his PSAT/NMSQT, PSAT 10, or AP Exams and in their classrooms. Students who may be eligible have a GPA of 3.5 or higher and have excelled on the PSAT/NMSQT or PSAT 10 or earned a score of 3 or higher on two or more AP Exams; and are African American or Black, Hispanic American or Latinx, Indigenous, and/or attend school in a rural area or small town. Eligible students are invited to apply during their sophomore or junior year and are awarded at the beginning of the next school year.

Naval Horizons Essay Winners



Cadet Aidan Kenney, 18, from Midland, Texas, who is in the 12th grade, was honored to have his essay posted on the Naval Horizons website. Cadet Charles Drapela, 17, from Boerne, Texas, and also in the 12th grade, received a cash reward as well.

Kenney wrote about seal whiskers and how they are a source of inspiration to how windmills work. Kenney was then inspired to keep researching about ways technology was developed by what happens in nature. He won the honorable mention because of how his essay was presented. "I didn't mean to win, but I thought it was a nice opportunity," Kenney said. Drapela wrote about mechanical engineering and chemical engineering and said he also did not imagine he would be winning. Both wrote their essays for leisure and because they are interested in the STEM industry.



We are extremely proud to announce that the Marine Military Academy was once again selected for the prestigious Marine Corps JROTC Naval Honor School. This is indeed a significant achievement and a testament to the hard work of our Military Department and our Corps of Cadets. This award is distinguishing, and it allows MMA the opportunity to send nominations directly to the U.S. Naval Academy, U.S. Air Force Academy, and the Military Academy at West Point. The award also provides students who have a desire to compete for the service academy the significant advantage of earning recommendation letters from the Commandant of Cadets and the President of MMA. This makes 13 in a row for MMA, and 32 total. This award is the top 20% of the MCJROTC schools in region 5 approximately 65 schools.
